Edith Macefield: Symbols of Resilience and Determination

Edith Macefield, born Doris Edith Wilson on August 21, 1921, was a woman of extraordinary resolve. Her story, which unfolded in the Ballard neighborhood of Seattle, Washington, has become a symbol of resistance against the relentless march of big companies that want to take people's property and use it for their businesses.

Macefield's early life was marked by a spirit of adventure and independence. Born in Oregon, she grew up in Seattle and New Orleans, and even lived in England during the 1930s. She was a polyglot, which means she could use several languages, having learned French before English, and was fluent in seven languages by her 80s. Macefield joined the military, but was later taken out of service because they found out that she was not eighteen. She stayed on to care for war orphans in England, and later returned home to care for her mother and work at Washington Dental Service. She was married four times, all in Europe, and outlived her last three husbands and her only child. Her only son died of natural causes when he was only 13.

In 2006, Macefield's quiet life took an unexpected turn. The Bridge Group LLC purchased most of the city block where Macefield's 106-year-old farm house was located to build a shopping mall. Macefield, then 85, was offered \$750,000 for her home, a sum later increased to \$1,000,000. The offer included finding a similar home in another location and paying all her home healthcare for the remainder of her life. However, Macefield refused both offers. Her refusal was simple – she didn't care about money, her mother died in the house, she was happy in her home, she did not want to move, and it was her home.

The developers proceeded with their plans, constructing the five-story Ballard Blocks Shopping Mall around Macefield's house. The sight of her small, century-old farmhouse, standing defiant amidst the towering edifice of the mall, caught the public's attention. Macefield became something of a folk hero, her story resonating with those who valued personal conviction over monetary gain.

During the construction, Macefield formed an unlikely friendship with Barry Martin, the

project superintendent for the new mall. Despite initial suspicions that Martin was trying to trick Macefield into moving, it became clear that his intentions were genuine. He became a friend and caretaker to Macefield, a role he maintained until her death in 2008. Edith died at her family home, and she was buried next to mother, who died in 1976 on the same sofa that Edith died on.

In a final act of gratitude, Macefield gave her house to Martin. Her house, now surrounded by the mall, stands as a testament to her indomitable spirit. Martin later sold the house for \$310,000 dollars to a man who wanted it for an office, but who also sold it. It is now owned by a company that is looking for a business to occupy it, but the house remains, a small home surrounded by the cold walls of a shopping mall.

After her death, Disney publicists attached balloons to the roof of Macefield's house as a promotional tie-in to their film, "Up." "Up" is a heartwarming and adventurous animated film released in 2009. The story revolves around Carl Fredricksen, a 78-year-old widower and retired balloon salesman.

After his wife Ellie passes away, Carl fulfills his lifelong dream of traveling to South America. He embarks on this journey by tying thousands of balloons to his house, lifting it off the ground. Along with him on this unexpected adventure is Russell, an 8-year-old boy who accidentally joins him.

Other real people have defied building developments like Macefield. Vera Coking owned a home in Atlantic City, New Jersey. Several wealthy and well-known people tried to buy her house, including Donald Trump. Coking continued to live in her house until 2010, when she moved in with her daughter. The house was destroyed by the new owner, as was the hotel and casino that Mr. Trump built right next door to Ms. Coking. The resort facility did not get enough business.

There are other examples of people who stand up for their homes all over the world, the Wu Ping house in China where she stood up to the Chinese government who wanted to build a shopping mall. Michael Forbes' house in Scotland is another example, and similar to Ms. Coking's home, was a target of Donald Trump who wanted to build a golf course on the property. Mr. Forbes' case is interesting because his hundreds of his friends helped him keep his home by buying small parts of the property, making it too much trouble to

transfer the ownership of the land.

Edith Macefield's story, and stories like hers, is a powerful reminder of the importance of standing one's ground in the face of overwhelming odds. Her legacy continues to inspire and resonate with people around the world, symbolizing the triumph of personal conviction over commercial interests.
